This sounds familiar if...

- People spend hours moving information between systems.
- The same questions get answered by hand, over and over.
- Your team uses AI tools inconsistently, and nobody can point at the gain.

— How this works

How I help

I start with the work, not the technology. Which workflows are expensive, repetitive, and stable enough to be worth automating. Then which of those are reliable enough to trust once they're running unattended.

Then I build them, or lead the people building them. I do both halves on purpose. The plan is more honest when the person writing it has to build the thing afterwards.

AI & Automation Opportunity Audit

Start with an Opportunity Audit

I go through the work your people actually do, week by week, and find where a machine would genuinely do it better. Some of what I find won't be AI at all. That's usually a good sign.

Usually around ten opportunities, written down with the hours each one actually costs today.

Each scored on business impact, build complexity, how reliable it needs to be, security and privacy, running cost, and who maintains it when it breaks.

The three I'd actually do, with the case for each and what it would take.

The ones I'd leave alone, and why.

Anything that has to be right every single time is a bad first candidate. Start where being occasionally wrong is survivable, and where you can tell that it happened.



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
